Five non-releasable birds of prey, some of whom came to WP for rehab as long ago as April 2011, finally arrived at their new home in Gatlinburg TN. Animal care director, Bettina Bowers-Schwan, had the birds placed in April of this year but had to wait to receive the federal paperwork that allowed their transport to their permanent home. Here's a brief history of each bird:

- Great Horned Owl** - found in bushes by a dog, came to WP on 4/13/11; suffered a shoulder injury that kept it from being able to fly.
- Turkey Vulture** - had been shot, came to WP on 9/26/11; resulting infection in the left shoulder rendered it unable to fly.
- Black Vulture** - body full of shot, sat on the side of a road for at least 3 days before arriving at WVP on 11/6/11; permanent left wing injury and head trauma rendered it unable to fly.
- Barred Owl** - caught in barbed wire fence, came to WVP on 12/14/11; too much tissue damage to left wing, unable to extend wing for flight.
- Red-tailed Hawk** - probably hit by car, found on side of road, came to WP on 12/27/11 with tip of right wing excised (missing upon admission); can actually fly a little but not well enough to be released

These birds owe their lives to everyone associated with Walden's Puddle and will now serve many years as educational ambassadors at Wildlife Encounter at Ober Gatlinburg. The vultures and Red-tailed Hawk are in new outdoor enclosures; the owls are inside in the nocturnal exhibits.

More close encounters with wildlife.

WP animal care staffer, **Gloria (Lina) DiMeola** has this story for us:

"One day in June I was riding down Whites Creek Pike when I noticed a bunch of Black Vultures on the left side of the road sitting in a circle waiting to dine. Right as I started to just keep driving on I noticed a smaller adult opossum move her head." In true WP tradition Lina pulled over to investigate and to help, if needed.

"Her jaws were dropped, indicating that she had been in a state of tonic immobilization (playing 'possum). Not only did she appear dead but half of her tail was chopped off. So - as always - I turned around, put on my emergency lights, chased the vultures away, and brought her to the Puddle." Lina guessed the opo was a first year juvenile because she was rather small "but feisty." WP staff found that besides the torn tail she had a few ticks. . . . and a few surprises.

When Lina next worked at the Puddle she checked up on "her" opo and was surprised to find that "she was a Momma with 10 baby opos in her pouch!" Lina's Opo - as she was called by all - was housed in a comfy crate, fed good food, and given time for her tail stump to heal. On July 23 Lina got to release the young mother Opossum with her babies.

What a happy ending for everyone!




Animal care staffer, **Anni Ranck**, worked with exotic wildlife in Texas from March 1 through June 6.



Anni tells us,

"This spring, I had the opportunity to intern at **The International Exotic Animal Sanctuary** in Boyd, TX. IEAS is a 501(C)(3) Non profit organization and a permanent home and education facility for abused, neglected, and confiscated animals. IEAS is one of only 15 AZA (Association of Zoos and Aquariums) certified facilities in the country, and it was also awarded the Merit for Zookeeper Education by the AAZK (American Association of Zookeepers). Basically, if you are still holding on to that fleeting dream of being a zookeeper when you grow up, this is the place to start! IEAS is currently home to about 50 exotic and native big cats along with 16 black and grizzly bears.

I gave daily 2 hour educational tours to the public about exotic pet ownership and conservation topics. I became familiar with what it is like following rigorous safety procedures working around 65 deadly predators. But the best part about this facility is that they have intern classes in grant writing, federal/state animal regulation laws, and firearm safety. And if that wasn't enough, I also participated in their highly esteemed and nationally recognized Emotional Enrichment Program in which I got to observe and record behaviors of the animals. This internship added so much to my resume, it's hard to list everything I was taught. It was a great experience!"
